

This month the largest part of the shelter's population were strays. A microchipped dog is twice as likely to be returned to its owner. Microchipped cats are more than 20 times as likely to be returned to their owners. Microchips are permanent, and the most reliable method of identification.

Schedule your appointment today!

Microchips are \$25.00 for implantation and registration in the Animal Care of Davis County animal registry. It is recommended that you also register your pet's microchip with the National Animal Registry.

Typical cost for national registration is \$15.00.





<u>December Summary</u>


- ACDC cared for a total of 444 animals.
- 140 pets (31.5%) were adopted via onsite appointments or at offsite adoption events.
- 66 animals (14.8%) were returned to their owners.
- 19 pets (4.3%) were returned to their owner in the field by an Animal Control Officer.
- 15 animals (3.4%) were humanely euthanized.
- 70 (15.8%) of our animals were cared for by Fosters.

Field Service



Field Summary

- ACDC Officers responded to a total of 977 calls.
- 479 calls were investigations such as potential cruelty or neglect, aggressive animals, license violations and animal bites.
- 149 calls were responding to loose or stray animals.
- 276 calls were nuisance complaints such as excessive barking, excessive feces, fence aggression, leash law and license enforcement.
