

COMMISSIONERS' MINUTES – DAVIS COUNTY

COMMISSION MEETING MINUTES

April 26, 2022

The Board of Davis County Commissioners met for their regularly scheduled meeting at 10:00 a.m. on April 26, 2022, in room 303 of the Davis County Administration Building, 61 South Main Street, Farmington, Utah. Required legal notice of this meeting was given.

Present on the dais were: Commissioner Lorene Miner Kamalu, Vice-Chair; Commissioner Bob J Stevenson; Curtis Koch, Davis County Clerk/Auditor; and Neal Geddes, Chief Civil Deputy County Attorney.

Excused: Commissioner Randy B. Elliott, Chair, as he was attending another meeting.

All documents from this meeting are on file in the Davis County Clerk/Auditor's Office. The agenda for this meeting is incorporated into the minutes as item headers.

OPENING

The meeting convened at 10:00 a.m. and Brian McKenzie led the Pledge of Allegiance.

Items

Payment in Lieu of Taxes (PILT) for \$489.19 — *Presented by Ben Nadolski, Northern Region Supervisor, Utah Division of Wildlife Resources*

Ben Nadolski explained that the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources are stewards of the wildlife in Utah and manage a lot of hunting and fishing activities throughout the state and also own a lot of property throughout the state. As a state organization, the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources is tax exempt. There is a code that requires the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources to make payment to the local counties in lieu of taxes (PILT). Ben noted that the \$489.19 is a reflection of how much property the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources owns but it is not a reflection of how much work the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources does nor the partnerships Davis County and the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources share.

Ben continued by stating that Farmington Bay is a huge migratory bird complex which is popular for waterfowl hunters, bird watchers, and outdoor enthusiasts. The Wildlife Education Center there is beginning to see tremendous amounts of traffic and a lot of shared constituents visit.

On behalf of the Utah Hunter's and Angler's, Ben presented the check to the Commission.

Commissioner Kamalu thanked Ben Nadoski and noted how important partnership is. She explained that the money doesn't reflect the importance of the land in Davis County as Davis County has one of the most significant ecologies in the Western Hemisphere. Commissioner Kamalu noted that land is on the entire state's radar with the severe drought and keeping that ecology healthy.

Ben stated that the Utah Division of Wildlife Resources' culture is strongly rooted in partnership. He explained that the Division of Wildlife has authority over wildlife, however, it does not have local land use authority and they rely on their partners to help with that. As an example, Ben noted that the amount of partnerships and funds that have funneled into the Watershed Restoration Initiative have completed over 2500 projects to date and invested \$316 million into landscape improvements throughout the state of Utah, for a total of \$771 million dollar economic output and almost 2.5 million acres have been restored in the state of Utah. The Utah Division of Wildlife Resources as an agency, from top to bottom, puts priority emphasis on partnerships.

Curtis Koch advised that Davis County received the following eight Requests for Proposals (RFPs) submittals:

It was explained that this RFP is a non-competitive bid, meaning if the applicants meet the terms of the RFP, they will receive some funding.

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Total compensation Analysis: Wages, Benefits & Classification RFP Register — *Presented by Clerk/Auditor Curtis Koch*

Curtis Koch advised that four vendors submitted RFPs in a timely manner. Those are as follows:

It was explained that the RFPs would be reviewed and a recommendation will be presented to the Commission.

Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting awarded to Davis County — *Presented by Clerk/Auditor Curtis Koch*

Davis County received notice from the Government Finance Officers Association (GFOA) that Davis County received its 28th consecutive year of recognition through the Certificate of Achievement for Excellence in Financial Reporting. Curtis explained that this is such an incredible accomplishment. Curtis read the following description from the GFOA's website:

"The purpose of this award is to recognize governments that go beyond the minimum requirements of generally accepted accounting principles to prepare annual comprehensive financial reports that evidence the spirit of transparency and full disclosure and then recognize individual governments that succeed in achieving that goal."

Curtis stated that is high praise for accountants. He continued by stating that to have the ability to present financial statements in a way that citizens can review them and understand their government is a high compliment to the Davis County Auditor's staff. Curtis then recognized the following staff members:

Curtis thanked those employees for everything they do and stated that this award recognizes these employee's efforts.

Commissioner Kamalu commented on how remarkable a 28 consecutive year award is and thanked the Auditor's staff for their hard work. She asked if Davis County has any competitors after winning this award so many years in a row. Curtis Koch answered by stating that Davis County is 1 of 3 counties in the state that have received this award. Curtis stated this is a fantastic achievement and it is his hope that the citizens of Davis County understand the work that these folks have done and what it means for the County.

Recognition of Becky Wright, Archivist - Clerk/Auditor's Office for her work on the preservation of the Centennial Time Capsule — *Presented by Clerk/Auditor Curtis Koch*

Curtis Koch explained that the 1996 Davis County time capsule, celebrating the State of Utah Centennial, was uncovered during the Memorial Courthouse project. [The project is a renovation of the historical 1932 section of the courthouse, which includes removing the 1958 and 1979 additions and the updating of the accessibility and seismic standards of the building.] It was discovered that the time capsule had been damaged and is assumed to have been damaged right after being put into the ground. Curtis Koch recognized the efforts of Davis County Archivist Becky Wright, who spent a tremendous amount of time and effort in recovering the items that were inside that time capsule. Curtis advised that Becky recovered and triaged every item in the time capsule, she logged and photographed the items, and did what she could to salvage them. Curtis explained that Becky researched and found copies of the original documents that had been put in the capsule and were decayed beyond repair. Becky took the items that were damaged and laid and dried them out. Becky froze a few of the damaged textile items in order to stop the mold from growing, then washed them with vinegar and water to restore them to the best of her ability to be placed back into the time capsule.

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Curtis stated that Becky used multiple scanners in order to get the best quality resolution for the original documents to be preserved. Becky did an incredible amount of work with incredible dedication. Curtis explained that Becky loves history and loves preserving history.

All of the work that Becky has done will be recognized when the time capsule is reopened in 2047. It was noted that had Becky not taken the time and effort, it would have been a great disappointment. Now, in 2047, the history of 1996 can be presented. Curtis stated he is confident with Becky's attention to detail and efforts, this piece of history will be preserved for the citizens of Davis County. Curtis Koch thanked Becky Wright for all of her efforts.

Commissioner Kamalu noted that Becky knows one of the greatest historians in our county and perhaps in the state and compared Becky to him. She noted that some people have a great love for history and it helps all of us. Commissioner Kamalu quoted David McCullough:

"Trying to make good decisions in the present without using information from the past is like trying to plant flowers with no roots."

She stated that when Davis County began working on the Memorial Courthouse Grand Opening, the County needed someone with expertise to pull all of the history and Becky was just that person. Commissioner Kamalu stated that Becky has put a lot of historical information together and expressed her excitement for the upcoming Memorial Courthouse Open House. Commissioner Kamalu expressed her gratitude towards Becky.

Becky Wright commented by stating that Chief Deputy Clerk/Auditor Brian McKenzie, Records Manager Rebecca Abbott, Archivist Rian Santoro, and some of the Facilities Department employees all helped her in this project.

Rebecca Abbott mentioned that Becky did the lion's share of the work on the time capsule project.

Commissioner Stevenson asked Becky if she was going to make sure the time capsule is done correctly this time around. Becky answered by stating she called the Utah State Archives and got their input on the best practices for the project and is hopeful it works.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

The public was invited to make comments to the Commission.

Rhonda Perkes from Congressman Chris Stewart's Office updated the Commission stating that the Congressman has been all around the district over the last two weeks, from Farmington to St. George. She advised that an official Town Hall was held in Farmington last Tuesday where 120 people attended and the chambers were full at Farmington City Hall. Rhonda told the Commission to feel free to reach out if any constituents need help with Federal issues or agencies.

Commissioner Kamalu thanked Rhonda Perkes for the information. She commented that she has attended a Town Hall where Congressman Stewart presented and mentioned it was well attended then also. She said she believes people enjoy hearing and learning from Congressman Stewart.

Ashleigh explained that the raccoons will have to be trapped by the resident and that a lot of the cities are providing traps to their citizens to rent at their City Halls.

14. Amendment #2019-341-A to the Regional Economic Development Manager Agreement with Davis County, Weber County and the Economic Development Corporation to extend the terms through June 18, 2024 — Presented by Community and Economic Development Director Kent Andersen

Kent Andersen introduced the Davis County Economic Development Team, Chanel Flores and Lyndsi Maglish. Kent then introduced Chris Roybal, Executive Director for the Northern Utah Economic Alliance and Theresa Foxley, CEO of the Economic Development Corporation of Utah.

Kent explained the formation of a new regional economic development entity was created three years ago through a branding process. The collaboration between Davis and Weber Counties has really helped in Davis County's marketing and development opportunities. Kent continued by stating that as individual cities and counties try to attract companies that do not see political boundaries, it is important to garner as much strength as possible from a region in order to satisfy the needs of the companies looking to locate in that region. Kent explained that there is a two year extension that is being proposed in this amendment. Kent then turned the time over to Chris Roybal and Theresa Foxley to explain more.

Chris Roybal began by advising that Weber County is also meeting today to extend this agreement. He explained that the Northern Utah Economic Alliance has tried to keep the Commission abreast of all of the Alliance's activities. He welcomed the opportunity to meet with the Commissioners and go over, in detail, the report that was put together.

Chris advised that Davis and Weber Counties are a natural labor pool for companies to grow and stated it was wise that Davis and Weber Counties have come together as a region to explore what can be done to grow and expand. The companies that relocate to this region do not look at the city or county borders when they are looking at Davis or Weber County. He further explained the population base of about 600 and growing is the natural labor pool that the companies in Northern Utah are looking at. Chris explained that this is how the Alliance is marketing the region. Labor is a big component and so is real estate, companies need a home and they need people to work.

Chris stated that there has been really good success over the first three years of the Northern Utah Economic Alliance name and brand creation. Chris advised that the goal is to brand this region as a location. Salt Lake was once the state of Utah's opportunity to do economic development and it is a really different landscape now. Chris stated that he believes Utah will continue to see the economic development push north into Davis and Weber Counties and south into Utah County. He explained that this is what this Alliance is all about, coming together as a team and stated that this will be great for Northern Utah. Chris then invited Theresa to speak on their partnership with the Economic Development Corporation of Utah (EDCUtah). Chris stated that Davis County's leadership is appreciated in this effort.

Theresa Foxley began by thanking the Commission for the trust over the last three years. She stated it has been a pleasure to work more closely with Davis and Weber County regions as we seek to brand this area as the future for job growth and economic opportunity. Theresa explained that she has had the opportunity to sit in a lot of statewide conversations and one thing she continuously hears is this notion of quality growth, which is something everyone is trying to collectively accomplish. Quality growth is important so that individuals who reside in the Davis and Weber County region have job opportunities in the region where they reside, rather than commuting outside of the region. Theresa discussed that the companies who seek to employ these individuals do not care about political boundaries, so this innovative and experimental partnership has proven to lead the state around quality growth and creating job centers at home. Theresa advised that over the past three years they have seen success in the joint branding, in utilizing the research team at Economic Development Corporation of Utah (EDCUtah), enhancing the state brand through additional marketing opportunities, and all the collaboration between Weber and Davis County and the individual cities. Theresa stated she looks forward to the next two years.

Commissioner Kamalu commented by stating that the Commission regularly receives reports about the progress and Chris Roybal emails the Commission and others involved with economic development. She stated it is exciting to see the progress. Commissioner Kamalu mentioned an article she read years ago that quoted Natalie Gochnour stating that Davis County is punching below its weight in economic development. She stated that having a regional focus makes a difference.

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Chris Roybal advised that the state has matched the local county's contribution which has made the partnership even deeper and stronger. He advised that they want to do everything to leverage Davis County's resources. He said that duplicating economic development services is not in anyone's best interest whether it is city, county, state, region, or public/private partnerships. The Alliance wants to be really smart about leveraging all of the county's economic development dollars together and safeguarding the county's money in doing so.

Commissioner Kamalu thanked Kent, Theresa, and Chris.

He noted that this kind of material is very expensive to dump.

Commissioner Kamalu asked if this item is for a flood channel. Adam answered by stating yes and explained that the channel is an overflow for Parrish Creek and Bernard Creek, it is a shared channel with Centerville City that receives water from two separate channels for overflow. It was explained that Centerville provided the design and oversight of this project and Davis County provided the construction funding.

It was explained that Santorini's is an awesome restaurant here in Farmington. They are huge supporters of public safety and are generous, great people.

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A couple of weeks ago, it was Communications Professionalism Week, known also as Dispatch Week. Santorini's donated meals to the dispatchers on April 11, 2022 in the amount of \$350. Chief Butcher took this opportunity to extend the Sheriff's Office's appreciation and to publicly recognize the Davis County Commission and the Davis County Budget Committee for their support in showing how important dispatch is to public safety. He stated that the dispatchers at the Davis County Sheriff's Office recognize and appreciate what was done for them during Dispatcher's Week. Chief Butcher extended an invitation to the Commission to attend a barbeque at the Sheriff's Office in celebration of Correctional Officers Week, which was recognized and began in 1984 by President Reagan. The Chief also invited the Commission to attend a flag ceremony at the Sheriff's Office on May 16, 2022 for Law Enforcement Week, recognizing all of the fallen officers in Davis County. Chief Butcher explained that there are a couple of different aspects to the program; these particular contracts are transdermal ankle monitors. These monitors sense a chemical release in the body and reports that electronically on a continual basis. There is another program where individuals will actually come into the Sheriff's Office twice a day and blow into a portable breath test.
