July 5, 2022

The Board of Davis County Commissioners met for their regularly scheduled meeting at 10:00 a.m. on July 5, 2022, in room 303 of the Davis County Administration Building, 61 South Main Street, Farmington, Utah. Required legal notice of this meeting was given.

- **Ligia Farzati:** Five Years with Davis County. Ligia was not in attendance.

Health Admin – *Presented by Commissioner Lorene Kamalu*

- **Kellie Farr:** Five years with Davis County. Kellie was not in attendance.
- **Angie Jones** – *Presented by Deputy Director Rachelle Blackham:* Fifteen years with Davis County. Rachelle began by stating that the acts of kindness that Angie bestows upon her and others at the Health Department include creating luncheons, morale-boosting, and decorating the office. She explained that kindness extends to the clients that Angie serves. Angie started as a Lab Tech and then moved into the Lab Director position, then Angie became an Environmental Health Scientist, and is now one of the Health Department's Bureau Managers. Angie continues to take care of all of the water operators and Rachelle joked that, in turn, Angie protects the drinking water throughout Davis County. *Jay Clark, Environmental Health Services Division Director* said a few words as Angie's supervisor. Jay stated that Angie is a person who deserves a lot of recognition and is the glue to the Environmental Health Services Division. Jay expressed his happiness for having Angie on the team.

- **Austin Cronnelly:** Fifteen years with Davis County. Austin was not in attendance.

Sheriff's Office – *Presented by multiple Sheriff's Office Supervisors*

- **Andrew Fisher** – *Presented by Captain Boydston:* Five years with Davis County. Captain Boydston advised that Andrew started his career in the Maintenance Department which is where he and Andrew first met while working on patrol cars. Andrew put himself through LEO (Law Enforcement Officer) Training and was then hired by the Sheriff's Office in Corrections. Andrew was sent to the BCO (Basic Correctional Officer) Academy with Captain Boydston and would push him to run the mile for the PT Test. It was explained that after serving about a year in Corrections, Andrew transferred to the Patrol Division and has been there since. Captain Boydston thanked Andrew for the great job he has done.
- **Gary Matthews** – *Presented by Captain West:* Five years with the Sheriff's Office. Captain West began by sharing what a sergeant of his said to him a long time ago, "There are two types of cops. The doers and the watchers." Captain West stated that Deputy Matthews is definitely not a watcher, he is a doer. He is always willing to step up and help. Deputy Matthews is a mentor to younger deputies and has a can-do attitude, which is really appreciated.

It was noted that Deputy Matthews is currently assigned to the courts and is one of the first faces the public sees and the Sheriff's Office is proud to have him as he is an experienced deputy having worked elsewhere prior to working for Davis County. Captain West expressed his gratitude to Gary Matthews.

- **Jacy Diehl:** Ten years with Davis County. Jacy was not in attendance.

- **Jennifer Schow** – *Presented by Sergeant Swaner:* Ten Years at Davis County Sheriff's Office. Sergeant Swaner advised that Jennifer is probably one of the hardest working people at the Sheriff's Office and has an amazing work ethic. He stated that above all, it is her huge heart that means so much to those at the Sheriff's Office. She began as a deputy and then began assisting in training as the Training Coordinator. Jennifer then moved to the Classification Section and was immensely helpful there. Recently, she became a Background Investigator and that division has already seen great strides just from Jennifer being there. Jennifer started the Peer Support Group at the Sheriff's Office, which was greatly needed. Sergeant Swaner expressed his appreciation to Jennifer and stated how lucky the department is to have her. Jennifer truly cares about everyone.

- **Russell Baer** – *Presented by Sergeant Jared Meldrum:* Fifteen Years with the Sheriff's Office. Sergeant Meldrum advised that Russ spent three years in Metro Narcotics and had a very distinguished career, winning quite a few awards for his work there. He continues to bring his investigative skills to the jail. Russ is currently our gang specialist as he knows more about gangs than anybody at the Sheriff's Office and does a lot of interviews with inmates finding out everything he can about gang affiliations. He went on to state that Russ is down in the trenches doing a lot of the work that not everyone would want to do every day and that work is what keeps the people in the jail safe. Sergeant Meldrum thanked Russ.

- **Ronald Rowe** – *Presented by Lieutenant Jeff Jensen.* Twenty Years with the Sheriff's Office. Lt Jensen stated that Ron is amazing; he could talk about Ron and the stuff he has done for hours. He explained that Ron left his family business, New England Sandwich Shop, and came to the Sheriff's Office to receive benefits and retirement, twenty years later the Sheriff's Office still has him and the County is so lucky. Ron started his career in property and organized it for an inventory system that is still used today. Ron then became a Corporal and soon after that, became a Sergeant and moved over to the Work Center. As soon as Ron got there, the COVID Pandemic hit and new programs had to be started. The Work Center was closed down and the AMP, the ankle monitoring system was started. Ron wrote the policies for that program, began running it, and then, Chief Butcher requested a 24/7 program which Ron started and both of the programs are up and running smoothly. Agencies in both Salt Lake and Weber Counties have begun utilizing that program. Ron loves the Sheriff's Office and is more dedicated than anyone there. Ron never complains when given a task or assignment, he just takes it and runs with it. Lt Jensen addressed Ron and stated that it is a privilege to recognize him and expressed his appreciation for his twenty years of service.

- **Garland Fahrner** – *Presented by Chief Deputy Arnold Butcher.* Thirty Years with Davis County. Chief Butcher began by stating what a privilege it is to introduce and talk about Garland and what he has done for Davis County. Garland started in public service in 1985 with the Clearfield Fire Department. In 1992, he was hired on part-time with the ambulance service in Davis County and has endlessly dedicated himself to Emergency Medical Service (EMS), public safety and to firefighting. Garland retired in 2022 from the fire department and eventually became a full-time employee with Davis County Ambulance and was one of the few full-time employees on the ambulance service. When the ambulance went out of service and the fire departments began doing that, Garland moved over to the Corrections Division as a Booking Clerk. He has also worked as a Jail Operations Specialist and is currently one of the jail's Training Directors. Chief Butcher advised that Garland also worked in Emergency Services as an EMS Training Officer at Emergency Management, which is a national institute and he serves as a member of their board. Garland instructs Homeland Security and FEMA. He is certified as a POST instructor, an EMS instructor, and an EMS Training Officer. Chief Butcher stated that he has personally been on critical scenes with Garland as an EMT and Paramedic and watched him save lives. He stated that when you would respond to a critical incident and see Garland there, you knew everything was going to be ok and that Garland would take care of it. Garland has saved lives and has impacted lives tremendously and his love for that continues. Chief Butcher spoke about Garland's family life and hobbies. Chief Butcher then expressed his gratitude to Garland for his 30 years of service.

Commissioner Kamalu moved to reconvene the Commission Meeting. Commissioner Stevenson seconded the motion. All voted Aye.

COMMISSION COMMENTS

Commissioner Elliott invited other comments from the dais.

Commissioner Kamalu commented on the opening of the new medical wing at the Davis County Jail. She offered many congratulations to the Sheriff, Kelly Sparks and to his entire team. She also congratulated the Justice Complex Maintenance Manager, Mitch Matern, on all of his work over the last few years. Despite supply delays, the project was completed in a timely manner and under budget. She continued by stating what a tremendous help the new medical wing will be to the jail staff as well as the inmates who have challenging addictions, mental health situations, and not to mention the pandemic. She explained that during the COVID-19 Pandemic, folks had to be separated and it was challenging to treat people with negative air conditions.

Commissioner Kamalu commented on July being a very special time for our nation and our state. She announced that there was a tragic accident during the Kaysville City Parade, which she was attending, and she expressed her thoughts and prayers to those impacted. She thanked those who were there to respond and recognized their help. She stated that it is easy to take those responders for granted until a response is needed. She also recognized all the thoughts and prayers being offered to the family and those involved by the community.

Commissioner Elliott provided an update on the Centerville fire. He advised that fireworks are what set it off. He stated he spoke to the Utah Department of Wildlife Resources and was advised a Hotshot Crew was coming in to mop up the remaining hot spots but the fire is contained.

Commissioner Elliott urged people to be careful and aware and not to light fireworks in the upper hills. He stated that despite all of the signage asking people to not light fireworks in those locations, boxes of fireworks were located. He stated that Davis County had a wet spring and the grass is tender and starting to dry out. He also said that there are a lot of beetle kill areas up on the mountains.

He asked that the citizens be careful and to be mindful of the laws and regulations that are in place for these situations.
