

2026 Student Art Contest

Spotlight Bird: Black-necked Stilt

This art contest is for all Utah students in grades Pre-K-12. Only artwork that meets all rules and guidelines will be eligible for judging and display at the 2026 Great Salt Lake Bird Festival. Students may use bird field guides, the internet, or the provided teaching guide to learn about the birds' unique characteristics.

Rules and Guidelines

1. Artwork Specifications:

- Original artwork of the Black-necked Stilt. Artwork may not be copied or traced from any source.
- ❖ Size: Artwork must be 8.5 x 11 inches. Art that does not meet the size requirement will be disqualified.
- Surface: Artwork is to be created on a flat surface and must fit in a standard sheet protector for display (provided by the festival).
- ❖ Format: The artwork must be 2D and can incorporate drawing (pencil, ink, charcoal, etc.) or painting (watercolor, acrylic, oil, etc.) Mediums Not Accepted:
 - Mixed media, digital art, and AI-generated art will be disqualified.
- Realistic or stylized images are welcome.

2. Submission Requirements:

- Ensure artwork is complete and meets the size and format requirements; otherwise art will be disqualified.
- Complete the entry form and tape it to the back of the artwork. The entry form must be complete and legible to be accepted for display and judging.
- ❖ Do NOT frame or mount artwork art must be able to fit in a standard 8.5 x 11 inch sheet protector for display, which will be provided by the Great Salt Lake Bird Festival.
- Only one entry per student is allowed.

3. Submission Process:

4. Viewing and Awards:

- Artwork will be displayed for viewing during the festival at Western Sports Park, located at 151 South 1100 West in Farmington. Additional details on viewing times, the award ceremony, and the evening's program can be found at GreatSaltLakeBirdFest.com
- ❖ After the festival, winning artwork will be uploaded to the GSLBF website for digital gallery viewing.
- Artwork will be judged in five grade categories: Preschool-K, 1-3, 4-6, 7-9, and 10-12. First, second, and third place awards will be given in each category. The prize for first-place entries is \$50.00; second-place is \$25.00; and third-place is \$15.00. The Best of Show entry will receive a \$75.00 prize.

Teaching Guide: Black-necked Stilt (Himantopus mexicanus)

Identification

The Black-necked Stilt is one of the easiest shorebirds to recognize. Its wings, back, and head are all black, providing a vibrant contrast to its bright white face and belly. Its legs are long and thin, exactly like, you guessed it, stilts! And best of all, its legs are bubblegum pink. They have the second-longest legs in proportion to their bodies of any bird, exceeded only by flamingos. This small-bodied shorebird has a thin, straight needle-like bill. When spotting them in the wild, listen for their "kip-kip-kip-kip".

Habitat

The Black-necked Stilt is a huge fan of the shallow water, but they seldom swim. You can commonly find them wading in grassy marshes, mudflats, or along the shores of wetlands like those at Great Salt Lake. They even build their nests on the ground near the water's edge; talk about poolside access!

Food

The Black-necked Stilt is a master bug catcher. They use their long, skinny bills to pick their food right off the water's surface or to probe it from the mud. Some of their favorite appetizers are insects, tiny bite-sized fish, crustaceans, and slimy snails. When they feel like fast food they can even grab flying insects right out of the air.

Interesting Facts

The Black-necked Stilt's nest is a nuclear household, meaning both mom and dad birds take turns sitting on their eggs while the other is off feeding. The Black-necked Stilt soaks itself in water before sitting on its eggs to keep them cool. Who needs AC when you have damp

feathers? Typically a female will lay a clutch of four eggs. These eggs are light tan with dark speckles, which provides camouflage in their shallow ground nests. The incubation period is about 25 days. Baby stilts are able to run awkwardly within about 2 hours of hatching.

Black-neck Stilts are social birds and can often be found in groups. When there are predators nearby or they feel threatened they fly as one body attempting to appear bigger, while calling out loudly. Sometimes when defending their nests they perform a distraction display by pretending to be injured. Give that bird an Oscar!
