The Great Salt Lake Bird Festival turns 25 this year, and we want to celebrate with you! Discover Davis, Utah's Amusement Capital, is pleased to once again welcome you to the Great Salt Lake Bird Festival in beautiful northern Utah. Davis County is home to the Great Salt Lake, a major North/South migration route for more than 250 bird species, making it one of the top places for birders to catch unique glimpses of our many feathered friends. BIRD SPOTLIGHT: FLAMMULATED OWL

Dwelling high in the mountains amidst the head waters of the rivers that flow downward to nourish Great Salt Lake and its associated wetlands, lives a tiny owl.

The Flammulated Owl is so appropriately named; the definition of flammulated being reddish in color or resembling a flame perfectly describing the flickering splash of rusty, flame-colored feathers on grayish brown plumage.


Many species of owls occur worldwide. Owls are familiar to most cultures present or past, their haunting gestalt often embedded into folklore and myths.

Most humans when conjuring up an image of an owl think of one of the large more observed species like the Great Horned Owl. The diminutive Flammulated Owl, during the nesting season, flies between the trees of remote pine, fir, and aspen forests, obscurely perched, camouflaged on a limb, or hidden deep in a cavity, its presence so seldom detected by human senses that in the past, the Flammulated Owl has been considered rare. As often happens when humans jump to conclusions with

partial data, today, through research this human misperception has been rectified. Flammulated Owls are now known to be common and widespread nesters throughout mountains of western North America and Mexico. Some have suggested it is perhaps the most common raptor of mountain forests.

A Great Horned Owl stands almost two feet tall. At less than half that size, the common Western Screech Owl is 8 1/2 inches. Flammulated owls are closely related to screech owls. Imagine if a screech owl were to be shrunk a bit to 6-7 inches, the ear tufts shortened, the yellow eyes turned to pits of pitch black and the plumage sprinkled with rufous feathers you would have a semi resemblance of a





Flammulated Owl. Between the size of a robin and a sparrow, the Flammulated Owl is the second smallest owl in North America, only the Elf Owl being smaller.

To everything, there is a season. All nature moves in rhythms and cycles, interwoven and dependent. Many owl species hunt by sound preying on both vertebrates and invertebrates. Food is available year-round. The Flammulated Owl is a visual hunter on a quest for insects, predominantly moths, beetles and crickets. When the chills of approaching winter lull insect activity the Flammulated Owl, in full synchrony with the seasons, heads south to warmer climes to winter mainly in Central America countries like Guatemala and El Salvador.

It is one of the most migratory of owl species. The wings, longer and more pointed than most owl species reflect an adaptation for their long migratory journey. In spring, they fly north in late April or early May when many insects are awakening, in motion once again.

Although the owls are seldom seen, their presence can be felt and heard on a nocturnal walk into their territory in the early breeding season. The male voices a low-pitched soft hoot repeated over and over with a ventriloquist quality lending an almost eerie resonance to the stillness of the night.

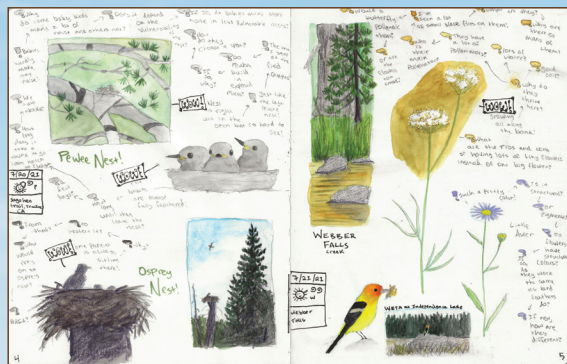
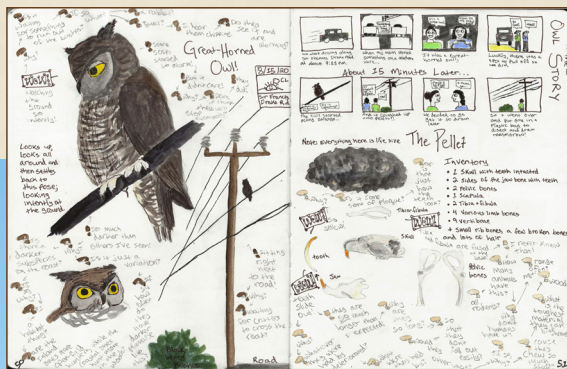

2023 OPENING NIGHT SPEAKER: FIONA GILLOGLY

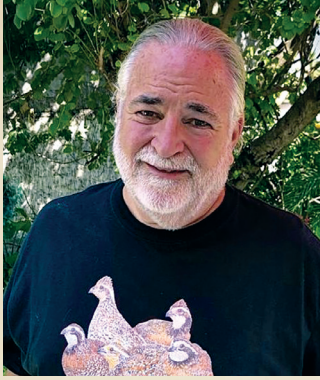


Born and raised in Northern California, Fiona Clare Gillogly, age 19, is an avid birder, artist, nature journaler, and advocate for nature. She has taught classes and given talks on birding and nature journaling for many organizations, including Audubon California, the Exploratorium in San Francisco, Environment for the Americas/World Migratory Bird Day, the San Francisco Bay Bird Observatory, and the Point Reyes Birding Festival. In June 2020, the American Birding Association's *Birding* magazine published Fiona's article and illustrations, "A Birder's Brain on Paper: How keeping a nature journal improves our birding experiences." 2023 KEYNOTE SPEAKER: MARK STACKHOUSE



For Mark Stackhouse, birding has been his passion since he was 5 years old, and he can't even remember a time before he was a birder. Mark has enjoyed watching birds throughout the Americas, and especially likes to share the beauty of birds and nature with other people. For most of his life, he has done this through teaching and guiding others in the field, his writing, and photography.

Mark has guided birders for nearly 50 years, has worked as a consulting biologist, developed and managed education

programs at Tracy Aviary in Salt Lake City, and has taught college-level courses in Field Ornithology in both English and Spanish. On his first visit to San Blas, Nayarit, Mexico, 24 years ago, Mark fell in love with Mexico, its people, culture, landscapes, and of course its spectacular birding. He now lives in San Blas, and has guided birders to nearly every part of Mexico over the last 20 years. Mark lives with his wife, Elizabeth Oregón Gonzalez, a native of San Blas, and their daughter Daniela.

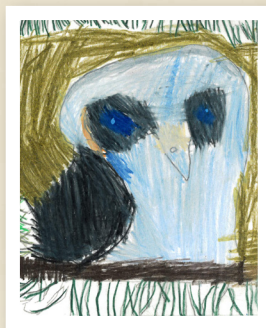

STATE OF THE GREAT SALT LAKE

Presenter(s): Lynn Defratis

In 2019, the Utah Legislature and Governor Cox unanimously supported (HCR-10) House Concurrent Resolution to Address Declining Water Levels of the Great Salt Lake. Finally there was a political will recognizing “the critical importance of ensuring adequate water flows to

Great Salt Lake and the wetlands to maintain a healthy and sustainable lake system.” Details in the HCR-10 report released December 2020, provided recommendations to be considered that would meet the goal of addressing and mitigating declining lake levels. In November 2022,

Great Salt Lake hit a new historic record low, increasing salinity concentrations in Gilbert Bay (South Arm) to the point where the ecological viability of the food web is now in peril, thus endangering the millions of birds that depend on that food web for survival. This presentation will provide an update of the ongoing work to sustain the future of this hemispherically important ecosystem.

WHAT IS THE GSL BIRD FEST BIRD RACE?

The bird race is a modified big day birding competition. A big day in birding is when you try to identify as many species as possible in a single calendar day.
