



Measles Exposure Locations

What is a measles exposure location?

A measles exposure location is a place that was reported to public health where a person that was sick with measles visited while they were infectious. These locations most often include public areas where it is not possible to identify everyone present.

Why is the time frame so long?

The measles virus spreads through the air when an infected person coughs or sneezes. Those infected particles can linger in the air up to **two hours** after the person sick with measles has left the room. This is why the times listed below are longer than you might expect.

If I was at one of these locations on the specified date and time, what should I do?

If you were at one of the following locations on the specified date and time, you may have potentially been exposed to measles. You should:

- **Review your immunization record** to verify that you are up-to-date on your MMR vaccinations. If you need a copy of your records or a dose of MMR, please reach out to your doctor or our Immunizations Clinic at 801-525-5020.
- **Watch for any symptoms of measles** that could develop over the next 21 days. These symptoms include cough, runny nose, red/watery eyes, fever, white spots in the mouth, and a rash. If you do become ill, please stay home. If you need to see a doctor, please call ahead of time to let them know of your symptoms and exposure. They will need to make preparations to see you without exposing others.
