

Immunizations

Who We Are

The Immunizations Program serves individuals and families throughout Davis County by providing access to trusted care, knowledgeable nursing staff, and affordable vaccines, including travel-related consultations. We are here to support community members in making informed health decisions by offering reliable information, respectful conversations, and accessible services.

Our team works to:

- Help parents and individuals understand the benefits of vaccination
- Listen to questions and concerns with respect and care
- Provide clear, evidence-based information in a non-judgmental setting


We recognize that health decisions are personal and unique to each family. Our approach is centered on meeting people where they are, answering questions openly, and working within each person's individual circumstances.

To help ensure access for all, uninsured children may receive vaccines through the Vaccines for Children (VFC) program, and a limited supply of vaccines is available to support uninsured adults. By reducing financial barriers and providing trusted guidance, the Immunizations Program helps promote a healthier Davis County for everyone.

Partners in Care

Parents have always been the decision-makers for their children's health care, including immunizations. Shared clinical decision-making describes how families and clinicians work together as partners to review information, discuss questions, and make decisions. While the term can be confusing, our goal is to help families understand their options and make informed choices.

Our nursing staff provides clear, accurate, and evidence-based information, listens to concerns, and answers questions. Through respectful conversations and trusted guidance, we partner with families to support decisions they feel comfortable with, while continuing to recommend childhood vaccinations as a safe and effective way to protect children's health and the community.



Vaccines Administered

In 2025, the Immunizations Program administered 14,476 vaccines, reflecting consistent use of services by individuals and families across Davis County. By offering accessible, affordable immunizations, the program supports personal health while helping keep the broader community healthy. This work includes services provided at the clinic, outreach to the military community through on-base clinics, seasonal vaccine efforts, and vaccination events at schools and local community locations, ensuring convenient access for working families and supporting the health of Davis County as a whole.

Serving Davis County

In 2025, 74.2% of vaccines were provided to individuals with private medical insurance, reflecting strong use of the Immunizations Program by working families throughout Davis County. The clinic provides convenient immunization services to all families, including those without medical insurance, offering trusted nursing care and flexible walk-in availability.

Travel Health Consultations

During the year, 826 travel health consultations were provided for individuals traveling to destinations requiring specialized vaccines or preventive medications. These consultations offer affordable options and education on food and water safety, insect precautions, and overall wellness during travel. These appointments are frequently utilized by missionaries and humanitarian workers preparing to serve safely abroad.

Access and Financial Sustainability

In 2025, the Immunizations Clinic submitted insurance claims to 121 contracted insurance providers, supporting the clinic's ability to operate through reimbursement rather than reliance on local tax dollars. This broad billing capacity allows the clinic to serve a wide range of Davis County residents while keeping immunization services accessible, affordable, and sustainable.

Immunizations

The Immunizations Program supports the health of Davis County by tracking community trends, collaborating with partners, and providing families with trusted education. Our work extends beyond administering vaccines to helping protect the broader public through outreach and coalition efforts.

School Immunization Coverage

Davis County continues to maintain high immunization coverage among students entering school:

- 91.4% of 7th grade students met immunization requirements
- 89.6% of kindergarten students met immunization requirements

Both rates show a notable increase from previous years. High coverage helps reduce the spread of vaccine-preventable diseases and protects students, staff, families, and the greater community.

School Exemption Trends

While overall coverage remains strong, exemption rates for both kindergarten and 7th grade continue to rise. This is a trend we are carefully monitoring, and the Immunizations Program remains committed to providing clear, accurate, and accessible vaccine education to support informed decision-making across the community.

Adult Immunization Trends

Adult vaccination rates for pneumococcal, Tdap, and shingles continue to increase in Davis County. Adult immunization supports community health by reducing disease spread and protecting the most vulnerable—newborns, older adults, and immunocompromised individuals. These vaccines help prevent serious illness, reduce strain on the healthcare system, and promote healthier communities overall.




Immunizations

2025 Impacts

- Administered 14,476 vaccines, helping individuals and families protect their health and access community activities safely.
- Provided services in-clinic and through outreach, including to military families, to homebound individuals, and at community events, making vaccines convenient and accessible for working families and all residents of Davis County.
- Conducted 826 travel health consultations, offering guidance for families traveling for missions, humanitarian work, or personal reasons, tailored to each traveler's situation.
- Screened clients for health needs and connected individuals and families to other programs when support was requested or identified after meeting with the nurse.
- Submitted claims to 121 insurance providers, allowing the clinic to provide affordable vaccines and services to a wide range of residents in Davis County.

2025 Awards/Recognition

In 2025, Craig Ferguson, RN, was honored with the Silver Syringe Award from the Northern Utah Immunization Coalition for his exceptional dedication to providing vaccines to homebound individuals. This award highlights Craig's commitment to personalized care, follow-up, and connecting families to needed health resources—and reflects the outstanding work of the entire immunizations team in serving all individuals and families throughout Davis County.

- Work to increase vaccination rates throughout Davis County through education, individualized plans with clients, and collaboration with partners and medical providers to build trust and respond to families' concerns and needs.
- Continue offering travel consultations and guidance that helps families make informed decisions for their unique health and travel needs.
- Ensure clinic services are convenient, accessible, and supportive, helping parents and caregivers protect the health of their children and families.

Maternal & Child Health

Who We Are

The MCH Program serves any family in Davis County with a child from birth to age 8. We are here for everyone—because every family deserves support, encouragement, and access to information and resources that are best for their unique circumstances.

Our team works to:

- Help parents understand their child’s health and development
- Answer questions, big and small
- Provide evidence-based guidance in a warm, non-judgmental way

Every family we serve receives an individualized care plan designed to identify their unique strengths, goals, and priorities. Rather than taking a one-size-fits-all approach, we focus on empowering parents to build confidence in themselves and their ability to care for their children.

This year, we made intentional efforts to increase awareness of the MCH Program and ensure families know support is available to them. We developed new outreach materials and handouts designed to communicate the value of the MCH Program services and how families can get connected. These materials are now being shared throughout the community, helping us reach Davis County families.



In this client success story video, a mom shares her journey—one marked by uncertainty, growth, and hope. Through her words, we see how access to support, encouragement, and individualized care can change the course of someone's story. 


2025 Most Common Referrals





Most Common Referrals

In 2025, the MCH program provided 265 referrals for child development play activities, 191 to food pantries, 114 to Davis Behavioral Health, and 131 to Open Doors, highlighting some of the many community resources and supports available to Davis County families through the MCH program. These connections help families address specific needs, promote child development, and empower parents to access the right resources for their individual circumstances, supporting self-sufficiency and confidence.

Assistance with Applications

Throughout 2025, MCH staff assisted families with 63 Medicaid applications, 106 Baby Your Baby applications, and 76 Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) applications, helping families obtain the benefits they needed. This support helps parents establish stability and access essential resources, promoting healthier households and stronger community well-being across Davis County.

Screenings and Literacy Support

In 2025, MCH nurses conducted 201 postpartum depression screenings and 967 child developmental screenings, helping parents identify potential concerns early and ensure children receive timely support. Nurses also provide guidance on reading, meal routines, and family engagement, which improves child literacy, developmental outcomes, and empowers parents to make informed choices for their children.

Family Insurance Coverage

In 2025, 50.3% of MCH clients were on Medicaid, 31.6% had private insurance, and 18.1% were uninsured, reflecting the program's reach to families across income levels. By providing education, screenings, and guidance, MCH supports parents in nurturing healthy children during critical early years, benefiting working families and reinforcing strong foundations for the entire community.

Maternal & Child Health

The MCH Program goes beyond home visits to support families and strengthen community well-being. We track data on school readiness, child development, and literacy, and work with local coalitions to raise awareness about early intervention, screenings, and the importance of addressing developmental needs promptly.

Preschool Enrollment

In Davis County, 41.5% of 3- and 4-year-olds are enrolled in preschool, placing the county in the 50th percentile in the state. Preschool supports school readiness, social development, and early learning skills. MCH actively helps parents and caregivers navigate enrollment, connecting families with resources and guidance to ensure children have a strong start.

Common Family Concerns

Families we serve most often come to the MCH Program with concerns about:


- Child development
- Health and safety
- Immediate needs such as food, housing, or transportation
- Social support and parenting resources

By addressing these needs, MCH helps parents access support, make informed choices, and build self-sufficiency for their families.

Literacy and Numeracy Rates

The MCH Program connects families with resources, screenings, and guidance that promote early learning and school readiness. Early support for children's learning is critical to long-term success. In Davis County, 72% of children meet or exceed literacy benchmarks and 69% meet or exceed numeracy benchmarks by early elementary school. While many children are thriving, there are three small geographical areas within the county where numeracy falls below the 70th percentile compared to other small areas in the state, which highlights the need for continued support. Additional early intervention helps ensure all children reach their potential.





2025 Impacts

- Completed 201 postpartum depression screenings and 967 child developmental screenings, helping pregnant individuals and families with children 0–8 identify needs early and access supportive services.
- Conducted developmental screenings that help young children prepare and build educational skills to succeed in kindergarten.
- Provided guidance and referrals to behavioral health services, mother support groups, Early Intervention, and Head Start, helping families access resources that support each child’s health, growth, and safety.
- Supported families in applying for 63 Medicaid, 106 Baby Your Baby, and 76 SNAP applications, helping parents gain stability and access essential programs.
- Connected and educated parents on resources and services to support their child’s development and family well-being, offering practical guidance for their unique circumstances.
- Offered appointments in-clinic, at home, or in community locations, allowing families to choose what works best for them.

2025 Awards/Recognition

In 2025, the MCH Program received the Department’s Project Management/Quality Improvement Award for their project, “Increasing Community Awareness and Participation in Maternal and Child Health Programs.” Their outreach improvements, including targeted mailers, text follow-ups, and strengthened community partnerships, resulted in a 176% increase in appointment requests from families. This recognition reflects the team’s dedication to helping pregnant clients and families with children 0–8 access resources that support their child’s health, development, and family well-being.



2026 Goals

- Expand developmental screenings through cross-referral of Family Health programs to help more young children prepare for Kindergarten and support their early learning.
- Increase maternal mental health screenings to help all mothers access support while caring for their families by building more partnerships with community providers.
- Continue helping families access programs and services that support children’s health, family stability, and individualized needs.
- Provide one-on-one guidance to assist parents in making informed decisions that work best for their family circumstances.

Women, Infants & Children

Who We Are

The WIC Program plays a vital role in supporting the health and well-being of women, infants, and young children during critical stages of growth and development. Most commonly, families come to WIC for support with:

- Access to nutritious foods for themselves and their children
- Guidance on infant feeding and child nutrition
- Support during pregnancy and postpartum recovery
- Help understanding and meeting their child's developmental and nutritional needs

Through education, individualized counseling, and food benefits, WIC helps families make informed choices that support both immediate and long-term health.





Who does WIC serve?

WIC serves income eligible pregnant and postpartum mothers, infants, and children up to age 5 who are considered nutritionally at-risk.

The WIC Program delivers strong cost savings, with estimates showing a return of about \$3 for every \$1 invested through reduced medical, educational, and productivity costs. Savings are even greater for pregnant participants, as prenatal WIC participation is associated with longer pregnancies, fewer premature births, lower rates of low birth weight, and reduced infant mortality—leading to meaningful healthcare savings. Beyond birth outcomes, WIC improves dietary quality, supports healthy infant feeding practices, and contributes to better growth and cognitive development in children. We are proud to serve Davis County, including our military members and their families, by providing this valuable program that supports healthy pregnancies and gives children a strong start to life.



WIC Dollars Redeemed

In Davis County, \$3,215,621.62 in WIC benefits were redeemed at 23 authorized local grocery stores, showing strong local participation and broad access to healthy foods. This investment keeps food dollars in the community while supporting nutritious diets and contributing to healthier families and a stronger local economy.

Fruits and Vegetables Purchased

In 2025, \$918,297.31 in Cash Value Benefit (CVB) food dollars were redeemed for fruits and vegetables, with an 80% redemption rate, demonstrating that participants are actively using their benefits. This high utilization supports access to nutrient-dense, whole foods that promote healthy growth and long-term health.

Breastfeeding Outcomes

In 2025, 80% of WIC mothers reported ever breastfeeding, and 49% reported exclusively breastfeeding for 6 months or longer, exceeding the national average of only 28% for exclusive breastfeeding. These outcomes reflect effective breastfeeding education and support, contributing to improved child health and development while promoting family confidence and community well-being.

Diaper Distribution Support

Throughout 2025, 53,278 diapers were distributed to families through our work with the Utah Food Bank as a supplement to their existing supply, helping bridge short-term gaps between paydays or during unexpected emergencies. This support helps parents maintain infant health and hygiene during critical moments while promoting family confidence and self-sufficiency.

Women, Infants & Children

Beyond food assistance, WIC looks at community nutrition trends and supports families early in a child's life to strengthen long-term health outcomes.

Healthy Weight & Lifestyle

Childhood obesity remains a concern in the community, with 10.6% of 8th–12th graders in Davis County being categorized as obese. WIC takes an upstream prevention approach by supporting children and families in developing healthy eating habits early in life.

In 2025, 5.76% of children participating in the Davis County WIC program were classified as obese, and 8.76% were overweight or at risk of being overweight. These rates are lower than those seen in older children, highlighting WIC's role in supporting a healthy start during the years families participate in the program.

Access to Nutritious Foods

In Davis County, 11% of residents report not having a reliable source of food. Certain areas of the county are at greater risk for limited access to nutritious food, which is especially concerning for families with young children. WIC helps address these gaps by providing access to nutritionally dense foods and education on healthy choices, giving children a strong start during a critical period of growth and development. Looking ahead, WIC will continue expanding outreach into areas with more food access challenges to better connect families with nutrition support and resources.

Reaching More Families

WIC serves 3,027 infants and children in Davis County, providing nutrition support during critical early years. An estimated 5,000+ children in the county live at or below 185% of the federal poverty level, meaning many more families may be eligible for WIC.

While about 3 in 5 eligible children currently participate, continued outreach is needed to increase awareness of this valuable resource.

Women, Infants & Children

2025 Impacts

- Redeemed \$3,215,621.62 in WIC benefits at 23 local grocery stores, helping participants access healthy foods while supporting the local economy.
- \$918,297.31 in Cash Value Benefits redeemed for fruits and vegetables, showing participants are using benefits to provide nutritious meals for their children.
- Distributed 53,278 diapers to supplement family supplies, helping parents maintain infant health and hygiene during short-term gaps.
- 80% of mothers reported ever breastfeeding, with 49% exclusively breastfeeding for 6+ months, supporting the long-term health of infants.
- Provided 75 pamphlets and referrals for maternal mental health and developmental support, helping families access resources when additional guidance is needed.
- Increased access to services through appointments at schools and mobile food pantries, making it easier for families to get WIC benefits and connect with other community services.

2025 Awards/Recognition

In 2025, Davis County WIC was honored with the USDA Gold Breastfeeding Award of Excellence, the only clinic in Utah to receive this distinction. This award reflects our team's commitment to supporting, educating, and connecting families on their breastfeeding journeys. Special recognition goes to our breastfeeding support team whose dedication, along with the efforts of the entire WIC staff, made this achievement possible.

- Continue providing breastfeeding support and guidance, respecting each family's feeding choices while promoting child health.
- Maintain supplemental resources like diapers and educational materials to support parents when extra help is needed.

Outreach


Outreach is a cornerstone of the Family Health Division, helping families and individuals across Davis County learn about programs that support health, nutrition, and child development. In 2025, Family Health staff participated in 218 outreach events, meeting people where they are and increasing awareness through in-person engagement and information sharing.

Pamphlets and tear-off flyers were placed in everyday community locations such as laundromats, thrift stores, and pawn shops, allowing families to take information and reach out when it worked best for them.


We also connected with families through food pantries, schools, summer park activities, and local community events, sharing information and answering questions in welcoming, family-friendly settings. Partnerships with pediatricians, hospitals, and “Baby Basics” birthing classes helped introduce new parents to WIC, MCH, and Immunization services that support healthy growth and development during early childhood.

Immunizations outreach extended to local government offices, businesses, and Hill Air Force Base, making flu and seasonal vaccines accessible for working families and individuals. School-based outreach helped reduce barriers such as transportation and scheduling challenges so families could access vaccine services in a convenient and supportive way.
