Criminal Justice in Davis County

Thanks to great efforts and cooperation among many offices related to the justice system and human services, Davis County has systematically taken steps to improve the criminal justice system to better serve our community. The Reentry Fair is the next step in these efforts.

In August of 2019, Davis County created the Pretrial Services Department as an alternative to pretrial incarceration. Later that same year the County and Davis Behavioral Health created the Receiving Center as a tool for “on the street officers” to funnel appropriate candidates into treatment programs instead of booking them into jail.

Staffing and funding for both the County Attorney’s criminal division and the Legal Defenders has been strengthened in an effort to keep pace with the County’s growing population and consequent need for increased criminal justice resources. The Sheriff’s Office created the Ankle Monitor Program in October of 2020 as a sentencing alternative to jail. Davis County Attorney Troy Rawlings introduced a “Conviction Integrity Unit” in November of 2021, to provide a panel of criminal justice experts to review claims of actual innocence.

The Criminal Justice Coordinating Council (CJCC) of Davis County has been in place for a few years and has just recently been formalized to align with a new Utah law introduced this year requiring counties to form a council to coordinate and improve components of the criminal justice system. Commissioner Lorene Kamalu is the chair of this council that also includes members from the Sheriff’s and Attorney’s Offices, Pretrial, Legal Defenders and Judges, and Davis Behavioral Health.
